Easter Sunday

APRIL 21, 2019

Acts 10:34a,37-43;
 Colossians 3:1-4 (or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8);
 John 20:1-9 (or Luke 24:1-12)

In all Masses of Easter, we renew our baptismal promises. Most of us were too young to remember our baptism; our sponsors and parents made the promises for us. But we must "ratify" those vows if we are to be Christians. We promised to renounce Satan and all his attractions; we promised to be loyal to Jesus Christ.

What does it mean to you to be a Catholic Christian? Do you just "go through the motions," or does Jesus Christ make a difference in your life at every moment? If Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead, then the Church is a fraud and faith is a sham. But if he really did rise from the dead, his message is true! And if it is true, then you must follow him with all your heart and soul and strength and mind.

On Palm Sunday, the New Testament reading (Philippians 2:6) told us that our attitude must always be that of Christ. Don't be a hypocrite; don't be two-faced: If you say you are Catholic, then be one. If you don't want to practice it, don't pretend!

To be Catholic means some tough decisions in this world. It means absolute honesty. It means carrying our crosses joyfully, whatever they be. It means having hope even when things seem hopeless. It means doing the best we can, and putting our complete trust in the Lord.

To follow Christ means purity of heart and body. It means that we use our sexuality only in the context of marriage. It means the moderation of all our appetites and desires, using them only as God intends them. It means standing up for what is true and right, even when we are opposed and laughed at.

If some of these things seem hard, realize that it is liberating to follow Christ! He frees us from entanglements which drag us to destruction. He gives us absolute joy and eternal happiness, for he has conquered death by his resurrection!

The first reading is a sermon of Peter to Cornelius. He tells the story of Jesus, concluding with the death and resurrection of the Lord. The second reading (Colossians) tells us that we should be concerned about the things of heaven, since (in our baptism) we have been raised with Christ. The alternative second reading tells us that we should live a "Passover" being a pure dough in Christ who was sacrificed for us.

The Gospel translation may not convey the full impact of the words "wrappings on the ground." In the original language, the words mean "wrappings laying in their folds." The idea is that the wrappings still had the contour of the body of Jesus even though the body was not there. It was as if the body had evaporated! The only explanation can be that he had risen from the dead. (Otherwise, the wrappings would show wrinkles, or would show that someone had snatched the body away.) Christ has risen! Let us be loyal to him.

Fr. Don's Doodlings

HAPPY EASTER!!! Wow, Lent is over. Are you happy? I am. And how did you do with Lenten penance? Were you able to take some extra time for prayer? Maybe come to Mass once in a while on a weekday? How about sacrifices? Did you abstain from something, maybe some sweets or liquor during Lent, or just not put as much on your plate at a meal?

Or how about finding ways of doing something extra? Perhaps reaching out to someone in need? Or doing a favor when an opportunity presented itself? Or maybe reconciling with someone, or at least making an attempt at it? These are what the author Matthew Kelly calls "Holy Moments." And I think that's a great concept that we can practice any time, all the time, not just during Lent.

If you were able to do any of these things or something like them, I'll bet it felt good. And if you didn't manage any of these, I'm not trying to make you feel bad. The reality is that none of us is perfect, and I bet that none of us stuck with our Lenten penance perfectly all the way through the season. One thing I chose was just to offer whatever my ministry called me to do, and do it to the best of my ability.

The important thing is to put faith into action. So now that Easter is here, penance is all over, right? Now we can forget doing penance and go back to real life, yes? No, not exactly. The idea of Lenten penance is to help us to be more prayerful, more disciplined, more thoughtful, generous, outgoing, throughout all of life.

I'm told of one person who chose a Lenten penance that s/he could continue to observe continuously afterward. Wow, that would be quite a feat if you lived to be, say, 85 years old. But it might not be something that you do every day. These are Holy Moments, doing something when the occasion presents itself – like offering a helping hand, being generous when you see an opportunity.

When you come to think of it, this is all about discipleship – about living our faith. We certainly can't relegate that only to the season of Lent. In fact, the Easter Season is just as important a time to live our faith, and to do so with great joy.

I always like to mention that Lent is about 40 days or 6 weeks long, but Easter is 50 days, 7 weeks long. So, Easter is a week of weeks, plus a day, i.e. Pentecost. The Church is wise in having the celebration of Christ's resurrection last longer than the focus on his suffering and death.

Let's have a wonderful Easter Season and see how much joy we can bring to our practice of continual discipleship, offering Holy Moments as wholehearted followers of Christ our Risen Lord.

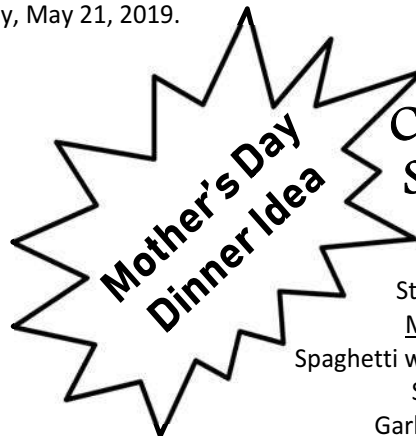


