Exodus 17:8-13; 2 Timothy 3:14—4:2;
Luke 18:1-8

Spiritual writers tell us that we pray to prepare ourselves to receive God's gifts. We do not pray to bend God's will. And we do not pray to remind him of his promise to do good to us. Nevertheless, today's Scripture readings seem to tell us to keep "nagging" God!

The first reading tells the story of a battle between Israel and its enemies in the Exodus. Moses prays with arms outstretched. As long as he keeps praying, Israel keeps winning. But when his arms get tired and droop, Israel falls back. So Aaron and Hur prop Moses' arms up so that Israel will keep winning.

The Gospel tells us the story about a little old widow who seeks justice from a corrupt judge. We can imagine her: about four feet high, in tennis shoes, rather shabby clothes, with an umbrella, perhaps. She keeps nagging at the corrupt judge. He won't decide in her favor because of the merits of her case. But he worries that the little old lady will beat him over the head with her umbrella! So he decides in her favor.

It is a parable, of course! The point is that we must keep "nagging" God. This means that we must persevere in prayer. Our perseverance will show that we depend entirely on God.

The second reading contains a beautiful expression about God's word: "All Scripture is inspired by God and is suitable for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives, and for teaching them to be holy."

When the author wrote these words, the only existing Scriptures were the Hebrew Scriptures or the Old Testament. But it is true of the entire Bible. St. Jerome said that ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ! Let us make daily Bible reading a part of our spiritual life. Let us nourish our souls not only with the Eucharist, but with the Word of God.

From Fr. Bob's Desk

As many of you know, I was away last week attending what was called a Leadership Conference. This comprises a group of friars – one from each friary – to discuss life in the houses. Each one of these men is called a “guardian,” which basically means that he cares for all the needs of the friars in his community. During these meetings we typically have some sort of presentation made to enhance the manner in which we live, and to understand each other better – and to grow, both in leadership and in fraternity.

This year, we were blessed to have Dr. Robert Furey make a presentation to us on the topic of human archetypes – those things that are hard-wired into humanity. We learned that there are basic things that all human beings have in common. This was true since the beginning of the human race, and it is true now. What is it that unites us? What are the qualities we have across time?

Briefly, five of them are:

- **THE WARRIOR** – fighter. Easiest for men to understand.
 - The one who can stand up for a cause – stands up for what is right.
- **THE SAGE** – this is what we heard maybe from grandma / grandpa / priest / something is said that you hold on to throughout your life.
- **THE CAREGIVER** – your potential to put others' needs ahead of your own.
- **THE JESTER** – this was once the wise one, who advised the king
 - Now it's the one who giggles / wants to laugh / to have a good time
 - Mark Twain said “You show me a man who knows what's funny, you show me a man who knows what's NOT.”
- **THE RULER** – the belief that inside all of us, there is the potential to lead.
 - A lot of us have trouble with our children, because parents refuse to be leaders.

Like many things in life the key to all of this is BALANCE!

We discussed other aspects of leadership, and how to have difficult conversations with others when the time is right – learning to use expressions like, “We need to talk – I've seen a few things...”

In order to be a good leader, you know how to say a hard truth in a soft way.

TOGETHER

We talked about what “Together” means – it's a very important word. “We're in this together.”

In the military, they often take roll – not just to see if everyone's there, it also let's everyone know we're TOGETHER in what we're doing.

This is how I see Stewardship in our parish – we're all in this together. *For instance, the friars often worry about diminishment... to which we say, “No matter how much we diminish.....we still have “together” – this binds us in important and holy ways.”*

So, these are the kind of things we worked on, together, as brothers, as friars, as Christians...as humans.

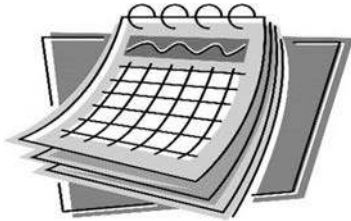

St. Augustine of Hippo and St. Benedict of Nursia.

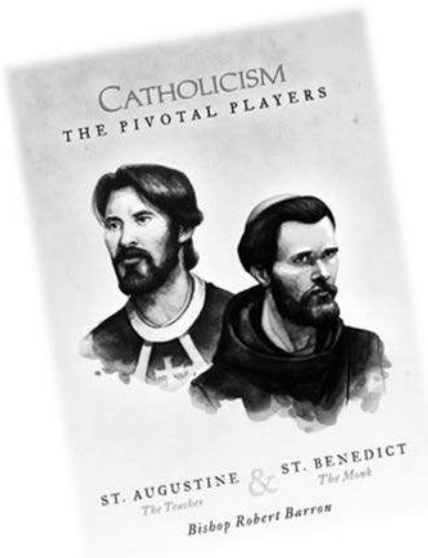


